

## JUNIOR LIVESTOCK SHOW AND SALE

### STEERS, LAMBS, HOGS, RABBITS & GOATS

All exhibitors must follow the General Rules and Regulations and the Animal Health Regulations.

All exhibitors must meet the rules and regulations established by the Committee. Official weight limits are included in these rules and regulations. Copies are available.

All animals must be housed in the pen or stall assigned to them.

Animals consigned to the Junior livestock sale shall not receive any treatment of drugs or biologics within the withdrawal time period to slaughter. Withdrawal time for drugs and biologics is stated on directions for use. If upon slaughter a recent treatment with drugs or biologics is the cause of condemnation of a carcass the loss of carcass will be borne by the exhibitor.

Members must be present and have charge of their animals at the time of judging except for reasons of ill health or family tragedy. In such a case, animals must be shown in conformation classes by another family member. Common sense rules apply as to helping a person having difficulty with an animal.

Weight classes will be determined after animals are weighed in. All hogs, lambs, goats and steers will be weighed off the truck. Only one time across the scales.

CLASS      DESCRIPTIONS

1.      RABBIT PEN (1 class for all entries)
2.      HOGS: 3 wt. divisions divided by wt., as nearly as possible, have equal numbers of hogs in each class. To facilitate this process, the Committee will have the discretion to determine which class an animal will be shown (this may mean that animals of the same weight may be split between two classes).
3.      STEERS: 3 wt. divisions divided by wt., as nearly as possible, have equal numbers of steers in each class. To facilitate this process, the Committee will have the discretion to determine which class an animal will be shown (this may mean that animals of the same weight may be split between two classes).
4.      LAMBS: 4 wt divisions divided by wt., as nearly as possible, have equal numbers of lambs in each class. To facilitate this process, the Committee will have the discretion to determine which class an animal will be shown (this may mean that animals of the same weight may be split between two classes).
5.      GOATS: 4 wt. divisions divided by wt., as nearly as possible, have equal numbers of goats in each class. To facilitate this process, the Committee will have the discretion to determine which class an animal will be shown (this may mean that animals of the same weight may be split between two classes).
